PROGRESS TO A SECURE FUTURE!

Step by step we are closer to achieving our dream of securing the Littledale-Brough collection of toys, trains and models in perpetuity for the public benefit...

What a year for the museum! As many of you may know the Brighton Toy and Model Museum commenced 19 years ago in 1991 backed entirely by volunteers. The collections have expanded over the years by donations and loans of additional quality treasures. Two years ago things were very fragile; we were struggling to pay the rent, could not afford a much needed paid manager, ran on an overdraft and had no financial reserves and had a relatively low profile in Brighton hidden under the run down undercroft of the station without being a significant part of the Brighton tourist scene. However, 2009 saw the start of the beginning of some dramatic improvements and we are excited to be able to tell you of some of our recent successes!


SO, WHAT IS ALL THE EXCITEMENT ABOUT?

Having secured funding, the Brighton Toy and Model Museum is actively progressing with a much needed improvement programme. A six month work development programme started in October last year and includes; improving signage and the entrance from the City's Visitor Information Point into the museum, improving the museum entrance, creating a much needed resource room/archive/learning centre, upgrading the lighting throughout the museum, improving showcases to enhance the display of current and newly acquired collections and finally to advance the learning experience for our many educational

Stacey is enabling us to pursue funding initiatives following our museum accreditation, increase visitor numbers through publicity and promotions, manage day to day operations and deal with the attraction and management of additional volunteers.

Following targeted fundraising and the support given by Network Rail to fund Stacey, Founding Museum Trustee, Michael Gilkes, initiated the idea of a management fund whereby the museum's supporters, trustees and patrons could contribute between £5

and £10 per week. We are delighted to report that the Museum and Collections Trust Chairmen, as well as our Director and six of the trustees in addition to five of our museum patrons and supporters have enabled us to fully fund Stacey up to the end of January 2010. For this year we are already over 25% towards our target of contributors.



OBITUARY

Wulf Never (1936 ~ 2009)



Wulf was born in Hamburg, North Germany on the 23rd November 1936 and came to England in 1966. Much of his career was in the pharmaceutical business. One of his great interests was railways and in particular he developed a great knowledge and skill with the HO gauge model trains from Märklin. These were all German prototypes of very high quality. This interest brought him in contact with the Brighton Toy and Model Museum where in the later part of 2004 he became a regular volunteer serving customers and talking at great length with any interested visitors.

Wulf soon became very attached to the museum, helping whenever he could, taking ticket money at special event evenings and progressing after the retirement of our Manager, Andrew Woodfield, onto the museum accounts and finances. During 2005, the museum trustees invited Wulf to join the Museum Trust in which his reliability became a valuable asset supporting the museum in any way he could. He was a great character who managed to give volunteers encouragement and confidence both in the shop, office and restoration workshop where he would frequently appear with some miniature engine of the Deutsche Bundesbahn (German State Railways).

In the latter years, Wulf was seen to be walking with an increasing awkwardness indicative of great discomfort in his knees. He never complained but it was obvious he was in pain and in early 2009 he had both knees operated on. All seemed a great success until he had an unfortunate fall and was admitted to Sussex County Hospital where on the 11th of May he sadly passed away during a secondary operation. He leaves behind his wife Angela and their two children. Wulf is greatly missed by all who knew him.

Museum Developments

MUSEUM UPDATES

Collections Trust Achieved Charity Status

The importance of our collections was recognised by HM Revenue and Customs who confirmed in November 2007 that gifts and donations to the Collections Trust are exempt under 'gifts for national purposes' and 'gifts for public benefit'. In February 2009 they confirmed that the Collection Trust is a charity for tax purposes.

Museum Accreditation Status Achieved

In August 2009, after many months of preparation and perseverance, the Brighton Toy and Model Museum was finally given full accreditation status by MLA as an 'Accredited Museum'. This achievement opens the way for public funding and further support.

New Lease granted by Network Rail in support of the Brighton Toy and Model Museum

In recognition of our worth to the Railway and Brighton generally, the Brighton Toy and Model Museum has been granted a new 15 year lease with rent fixed for the first 5 years at a substantial reduction to accord with what the museum can afford. The securing of the lease at a rent we could afford was a prerequisite of private funding which was confirmed in September 2009.

Through the good offices of the Chief Executive of the Railway Heritage Trust it was agreed that the landlord would bear their own legal costs. The Chairman of the Museum Trust, Alan Pett, arranged for the museum's own costs to be covered. This meant that a normally expensive exercise in relation to fee costs did not bear on the museum's finances and we are all very grateful for this substantial contribution in kind.

Financing and Financial Control

With so much happening it is vitally important that the museum budgets professionally and protects and enhances its income flows. With the generous help of Museum Trustee, Cecilia Kendall, working closely with the Chairman of the Collections Trust and the Museum Manager, strict accounting and budgetary control is in place. Due to the enormous contribution in kind (not reflected in the accounts) of the sponsors, trustees and volunteers the budgeted revenue expenditure of the museum is relatively small. Nonetheless these costs cannot be met solely from visitors. Whilst the new financial controls ensure that we stretch every pound we spend to the maximum effect we need your help with all the additional sources referred to in this newsletter to sustain our long term future. This year we need to raise around £20,000 from these sources. In addition we need to attract bequests and similar to the Collections Trust to give a secure cushion and fund our capital programme in terms of ongoing improvements and purchases of additional exhibits.

The Museum is now the Brighton and Hove City Council's official Visitor Information Point at the Station

The museum has long wanted to be recognised as an integral part of the cultural life of the City rather than be peripheral and with the help and support of the Director of Museums and the Royal Pavilion, Janita Bagshawe, this was achieved in 2009. Acknowledging our importance to the City, we were also approached by Suzanne Mantell from VisitBrighton, the tourist board for the City. Along with her staff, VisitBrighton has helped immensely to raise our profile by appointing us as the City Council's first official Visitor Information Point. Since the initiative began, the museum has benefited from increased publicity, shop sales, and well over 200 new visitors who decided to visit the museum only after coming in for directions or information. The museum is now positively contributing to the Brighton tourism industry by acting as the north anchor to the new VisitBrighton North Laine route to the Royal Pavilion, Cultural Centre and the sea.

Lighting Up Ceremony

Back in July, the museum played host to the 'Lighting Up Ceremony' commemorating the 'Station Undercroft Improvements' outstanding new bridge lighting and pavement improvements outside the museum and the Lewes Road viaduct. At this friendly and social event, guests included senior councillors from Brighton and Hove City Council and the Chairmen of both the Museum and Collections Trusts, Alan Pett and Anthony Capo-Bianco. Councillor Theobald officiated and formally switched on the lights, assisted by senior officers including the Director of Tourism and Director of Museums, who along with other council members, officers and museum guests enjoyed a glass of champagne, a chance to mingle and witness Museum Director Christopher Littledale's remarkable transport noises.

New Brighton Showcase on Station Concourse

Thanks to funding from Brighton and Hove City Council, input from VisitBrighton, sponsorship by Brighton and Hove Buses and volunteer time from Museum Director Christopher Littledale, volunteers Bob Moore and Peter Bryant, 1 Stop Travel in Brighton Railway Station now houses a wonderful showcase exhibiting a 2 ½" gauge model of Flying Scotsman, a gauge I model of a Pullman car 'Joan' and eight small scale Brighton and Hove model buses. The showcase guides visitors to the new North Laine route to the Royal Pavilion, the Cultural Centre and the sea.

Museum Lighting

When one of our funders commented on the dull nature of the lighting, it set us thinking! The first job was the long overdue need to clean all the existing showcase lights and re-bulb. Gordon Hall undertook this and hit upon the idea of removing the tops of some showcases so the lighting we were already paying for could reach the roof space. This alone has given a new lease of life and added just the right touch to the roof voids, so now we can all appreciate the aeroplanes that previously were hardly noticed. These will be enhanced by the addition of colourful posters and point of sale material recently acquired by the Collections Trust.

We have enlisted the support of lighting expert Richard Ludlow of Lighting Services of Bristol. Richard is sourcing the latest high output dimmable LED technology. LED has no UV or infra red output and results in a saving of 80% in energy consumption. Availability of lighting with a warm colour temperature of 2700K makes all the difference and the museum will gradually introduce these lights to feature particular exhibits and provide a degree of modelling, contrast and 'punch'. Also, new technology LED strip lighting is to be trialled in the new showcases.

Resource Room / Archive / Learning Centre

For years the museum had the ambition to create and fit out a resource room/archive/learning centre to house our wonderful collection of archive and resource material for toys and commercial models, as well as toy makers and the history of toys and railways. Thanks to generous private funding, the renovations were completed in November 2009. Museum Director Christopher Littledale, Collections Trust Chairman Anthony Capo-Bianco and Museum Trustee Milan Simek are currently organising the material. Exciting additions include original patents from the Meccano Company. These include the US patent for Meccano itself signed by Frank Hornby. Also to be added are company scrapbooks from the Bassette-Lowke Company and the research material from our Collections Trustee, Michael Foster, famed Hornby Dublo story and much more. Once finished, the room will hold a collection of international educational importance of value to collectors, enthusiasts, students and researchers.

International collector and supporter, Pierce Carlson, has generously donated some very useful reference books to the collections trust. If you have any books or catalogues you can donate for use in the resource room, please contact Stacey at the museum.

ACQUISITIONS

New

If you have not been to the Brighton Toy and Model Museum for a while, do not fail to pay special attention to some of the museum's newest exhibits. 2009 was a wonderful year for acquisitions to the museum's already varied and unique collection of toys and models. Throughout the year, the Collections Trust has acquired some fantastic new treasures including; a very rare Bond's 0 gauge Brighton Belle set, the Gordon Hall Collection, a Meccano block setting crane, various Meccano models including a traction engine, ferris wheel and large crane lorry and last but not least many vibrant colourful posters and point of sale signs which are already adding 'sparkle' to the exhibits. In addition, the museum has also secured access to many toys and models from an important collection. New showcases are being constructed in the top arch to accommodate these exciting star additions to the displays. The arch also now has a new floor.

In addition to the Savory double cylinder ploughing engine with its accompanying Fowler balance plough, which we emphasised in our last newsletter, Founding Museum Trustee, Michael Gilkes, has further acquired and loaned to the museum yet another superb piece of detailed model engineering, a 'Fowler cultivator'. This unique set of ploughing equipment is not just of great historical interest but includes objects of delight in themselves. If you want to see model engineering of the highest class, this is it. It is of course, a working model and has been steamed.

Old

At a meeting between the Chairman of our Collections Trust, Anthony Capo-Bianco, and Baron Bernard Snoy we learnt of the plans in Belgium to celebrate the bicentenary of the Battle of Waterloo in 2015. As a result the five Dioramas currently located in the entrance to the museum celebrating the rise and fall of Napoleon are being loaned to the Belgian organising committee. The accompanying credits in Belgium will give our museum an international presence. It is the superb quality of our exhibit that appealed to our new found Belgian friends. The area currently occupied will be taken up by the 'Brighton Showcase' (see page 9) celebrating the 'Glamour of Brighton'.

THE BRIGHTON BELLE IS RETURNING HOME!

The museum has made a successful link with the newly formed public body '5BEL Trust' which has resulted in our acting as 'front of house' for their plans to bring a 5 car set of the world's only all electric Pullman train back into service in time for the Olympics in 2012. This has initiated two new wonderful projects which will draw awareness to the iconic Brighton Belle and its resurrection to main line operation.

Brighton Belle Wall Mural

75 years after the first Lady Mayor of Brighton inaugurated the Brighton Belle at the Station in 1934, the 5BEL Trust, train operator Southern, station owner Network Rail, Brighton and Hove City Council, Brighton and Hove Bus Company, the Railway Heritage Trust, the Brighton Toy and Model Museum, the Littledale-Brough Trust (Collections Trust), local businesses and private individuals are planning to enhance the visual excitement of Trafalgar Street and the entrance to the City's official Visitor Information Point by creating a spectacular full-sized wall mural painting of a Pullman Car. This initiative came from our Founder/Director, Christopher Littledale, who created a wonderful illustration of how it would look. This is to be created on graffiti-protected demountable boards sitting behind the arches as though at a station platform, painted such that the coach ends at the entrance to the museum. The painting will feature the station roof and the front cover of the 1939-40 official Brighton Corporation guidebook. A finger post on the brick arch at the western end points 'To the Station' and at the eastern end, 'To the VisitBrighton Information Point, Toy Museum, Royal Pavilion, Cultural Centre and the Sea' adding visual excitement to the streetscape at the commencement of the City Council's important new North Laine route.

A minimum fundraising target of £6,000 is needed now to cover supplemental costs and expenses incurred in employing additional resources to those already available within the museum. The museum is bearing the cost of arranging funding, design, acquiring planning and listed building consent, organising and managing the project. We are well on our way to meeting this target, but there is still time for anyone passionate about the Belle to contribute and have their name publicly acknowledged as a sponsor.

So how can you help? Individual sponsorship of between £200 and £750 will see your name as a sponsor to the project on a plaque placed strategically by agreement both externally and within the area of the VisitBrighton Information Point. Furthermore any personal sponsorship contributions can be gift aided due to the tax status of both the Museum and Collections Trusts. This will give us an extra 28p for every £1 you donate, making your donation go much further!

Brighton Showcase in Museum Entrance

Situated within the museum entrance/shop adjacent to the Visitor Information Point will be a wonderful showcase celebrating the 'Glamour of Brighton' and the return of the iconic Brighton Belle. It will be enhanced by exhibits from and secured by the Brighton Toy and Model Museum and the Collections Trust including; the Royal Pavilion, Volk's Railway, the Brighton veteran car run, the pier, bathing and many other examples of 'Classic Brighton' along with the exciting plans for the restoration and return of the iconic Brighton Belle and railway and transport related items. Items currently in discussion include photographs from the Jack Gilbert collection (the last General Manager of the Pullman Car Company), a gauge 1 Pullman car from the 5 BEL Trust and a miniature replica of the dedicated Brighton Belle arch used at Victoria Station and other memorabilia and lastly news about the 5BEL Trust and the restoration of the operational 5 car set. There is also the scope for anyone to lend items to enhance the displays.

A minimum fundraising target of £6,000 is needed now to get the whole showcase area built, equipped, lit and for signage. This is currently partially funded through the generous support from those involved in the Brighton Belle Wall Mural Project. This target will cover supplemental costs and expenses incurred in employing additional resources to those already available within the museum. At this figure the museum would bear its own internal costs.

So how can you help? Individual sponsorship of between £200 and £750 for the year with an option to renew annually will see your name as a sponsor to the project on a plaque placed in the specific area of the exhibit most relevant to your interest. Renewal funds will help maintain and refresh the exhibits and assist with the running of the information point and the museum. Whilst aiming to bridge an historical memory into a current marvel we hope that both projects will greatly boost the tourist and visitor experience to the City Council's Visitor Information Point, the museum itself, and increase pedestrian traffic down the North Laine heritage route to the Royal Pavilion, theatres and the sea.
